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Introduction

Welcome to the 2018 York Dante Preview magazine presented by Timeform in conjunction with Betfair, featuring a full preview of each of the meeting's pattern races, including the Dante itself, of course, as well as the handicappers to follow feature and much more.

The feature on Wednesday's card is the Duke of York Stakes, which is run over six furlongs and has been won by proven Group 1 performers in the past, most recently Society Rock in 2013. There will have been few finer sprinters to have graced this race than **Harry Angel**, though, and Clive Cox's charge will be a hot favourite to add to Group 1 wins in the Diamond Jubilee and July Cup last season. He is forced to concede 5 lb to last year's winner **Tasleet** and **Brando**, who has race fitness on his side after a comfortable victory in last month's Abernant Stakes, but Harry Angel is clearly a rare talent when on song, and he looks sure to take all the beating on his return to action.

The Musidora Stakes, which is a recognised Oaks trial, also takes place on Wednesday. John Gosden and Frankie Dettori have teamed up to land the last three renewals and will be represented by the unexposed **Highgarden** this time round. Their previous winners were all sent off at odds-on, though, whereas Highgarden is not even favourite with Betfair at the time of writing, with that honour instead falling to the similarly lightly-raced **Ceilidhs Dream** for Ralph Beckett.

Golden Horn and Jack Hobbs went on to finish first and second in the Derby after filling the same positions in the Dante Stakes in 2015, and their trainer John Gosden will be hoping another Epsom contender can emerge from his two runners in Thursday's feature race, with **Crossed Baton** and **Roaring Lion** set to put their Classic claims on the line. The latter has already turned up in one of the big tests for the Classic generation, finishing a good fifth behind Saxon Warrior in the 2000 Guineas, while Crossed Baton arrives here on the back of a comfortable victory in the Blue Riband Trial, a race Permian was second in before winning this race 12 months ago. Permian's connections are represented by **Mildenberger** in this year's renewal, while **Wells Farhh Go** will also be doing his best to ensure the prize stays in Yorkshire.

The Middleton Stakes is the other pattern race on the card, and is open to fillies and mares aged four and over. **Coronet** ran well in a trio of Group 1s in the second half of 2017, including when chasing home stablemate Enable in the Yorkshire Oaks at the Ebor Festival, and is certainly an interesting contender. She could be vulnerable here after seven months off and running over a trip short of her best, though, with **Mori** and Irish raider **Turret Rocks** among those who could take advantage should she fail to reach the heights of last season.

Finally, **Stradivarius** looks set to go off a hot favourite for Friday's Yorkshire Cup. He didn't duck a single challenge in a busy three-year-old campaign, recording a first Group 1 victory when beating his elders in the Goodwood Cup, and it would be no surprise if there were more to come from him this time round, though there may need to be with a race-fit **Torcedor** among the potential opposition in this Group 2.

All in all, we look set for another fantastic three days racing on the Knavesmire, with the Dante in particular shaping up to be a most interesting renewal—head over to [Betfair Sportsbook](#) now to place your bets!

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


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York Track & Stats




Left handed, flat. In essence, York is a very fair track, ideal for the long-striding galloper. In recent seasons, the field tends to come more down the centre of the track than has historically been the case, particularly if conditions are testing. The track was made into a circuit in 2005, and offers a straight 5f/6f track, while 7f races start on a chute. Although it has a reputation for suiting front-runners, the data suggests that if anything, the opposite is true.

Duke of York Stakes

The Duke of York Stakes is a Group 2 run over six furlongs and has been won by several proven Group 1 performers in the past, including Society Rock, who gave weight and a beating to the Clive Cox-trained Lethal Force in 2013. Lethal Force would go on to reverse the placings in both the Diamond Jubilee Stakes and the July Cup, but Cox is still seeking a first win in this race. He will have few better chances to get on the board than this year, however, with reigning champion sprinter Harry Angel set to make his reappearance...

A Group 2 winner as a juvenile, **Harry Angel** quickly developed into a top-class performer last season, recording wins in the Sandy Lane Stakes at Haydock (course-record time), the July Cup at Newmarket and the Sprint Cup back at Haydock (by four lengths from **Tasleet**). He looked in a different league to his rivals on the latter occasion and, though failing to confirm that promise on

his final start at Ascot, it would be no surprise if there were more to come from him as a four-year-old. 3 lb clear on Timeform ratings despite conceding weight all round, he looks sure to take all the beating if anywhere near his best, with this speed-favouring track also expected to suit.

Tasleet is already proven over this C&D, unbeaten in two starts including this race (by two and a

half lengths from Magical Memory) 12 months ago. He was rather put in his place in the aforementioned Sprint Cup, but it is still difficult to knock his record in all the top sprints last season, having also filled the runner-up spot in the Diamond Jubilee Stakes and the Champions Sprint Stakes (Harry Angel fourth, **Brando** sixth), both at Ascot. He certainly deserves to add another big win to his tally this term and looks sure to give another good account here.

Brando does not boast as consistent a profile as Tasleet—he reportedly bled when a tailed-off favourite in this race last year—but Kevin Ryan’s charge is clearly a very smart performer on his day, as he showed when recording a first Group 1 win in the Prix Maurice de Gheest at Deauville last August. He made a winning reappearance after six months off (also had wind operation) in the Abernant Stakes at Newmarket (for second year running) last time, and is another who could take advantage should the favourite not come up to scratch here.

Gelded since last seen, **Sir Dancealot** shaped well when second in the Abernant, forced to come from rear in a slowly-run race and doing well under the circumstances to be beaten just three quarters of a length. That represented a step in the right direction after a largely frustrating 2017 campaign, though he needs a career best to figure now stepping up further in grade.

Similar comments apply to the remaining three entries, headed by last-time-out listed winner **Perfect Pasture**. The fact that he’s proven himself fit and in top form is at least a plus, and more than can be said for **Artistica** and **Ornate**. That pair were well held on their respective seasonal debuts and, though likely to come on for the run, even their best form leaves them both with plenty to find here.

In summary, this looks a hot renewal of this Group 2 despite the small field, with **Harry Angel** arguably the star attraction on show at the entire meeting. He has to concede 5 lb to a pair of top sprinters in the shape of Tasleet and Brando, but the pick of his efforts last term set a clear standard, and the four-year-old could afford to arrive here a little undercooked and still win on that evidence.

Musidora Stakes

The Musidora Stakes, a 1¼m Group 3 open to three-year-old fillies, is a leading trial for the Oaks, with six winners of the race have gone on to achieve victory at Epsom the following month—the first was Noblesse in 1963, and the most recent was Sariska in 2009. The 2015 winner Star of Seville, on the other hand, went on to land the Prix de Diane, the French equivalent of the Oaks, for trainer John Gosden, who will again saddle the likely favourite as he and Frankie Dettori bid for a fourth consecutive victory in this race...

By the same sire as Enable, a first Classic winner for Nathaniel in the 2017 Oaks, **Highgarden** looked a good prospect in justifying short odds at the first time of asking at Newbury in October, hitting the front over a furlong out and keeping on well to win in dominant fashion. There was plenty of encouragement to be taken from her return at Sandown last month, too, though finishing only third at 11/10-on, as she still looked

green and was only really hitting top gear in the latter stages. She is expected to improve significantly with that outing under her belt and it would be no surprise if she were to enhance her Oaks credentials with a bold show here.

A winner of a minor event at Lingfield in September, **Give And Take** proved better than ever when second in the Sandown race that played host to Highgarden's return,

no sooner wearing down the leading pair than overwhelmed by the promising Crystal Hope inside the final furlong. With just a length and a quarter between her and Highgarden on that occasion, the pair are seemingly very closely matched, though John Gosden's filly is perhaps open to the more improvement after just two starts.

Top on Timeform's weight-adjusted ratings and the main threat to that pair according to the betting is the Ralph Beckett-trained **Ceilidhs Dream**. She stepped up markedly on her debut form when getting off the mark at Newmarket last month, forced to deliver her challenge from the rear after a slow break and ultimately doing well to run down the runner-up with a bit in hand. The front two were clear of the rest and she looks likely to go on improving, while it is worth noting that she is not entered in the Oaks, far from guaranteed to stay a mile and a half on breeding (half-sister to a five-furlong winner).

Dancing Brave Bear and **Ejtyah** come into this race with similarly unexposed profiles, unbeaten in three combined starts. The former followed up her debut success with a comfortable victory at Chelmsford last time, leaving the impression this longer trip will be well within her range, and it would be no surprise if there were more to come on her turf debut, while Ejtyah was value for more than the official winning margin when making a winning debut, also at

Chelmsford, in December. She did well to win given how the race developed that day (came from rear in a steadily-run race) and is open to considerable progress, with David Simcock's filly likely to relish the extra two furlongs here.

The form of **Lubinka's** sixth in the Fillies' Mile is among the best on offer in this field, but she has less scope for improvement than most than this line up and looks likely to come up a bit short, a comment that also applies to recent Beverley winner **Expensive Liaison**.

In summary, it could pay to concentrate on the top three in the betting here, with **Highgarden** fancied to show the benefit of her return with a second career victory. Her connections know what it takes to win this race and it is worth remembering the excellent impression she created on her debut in the autumn.

Middleton Stakes

Sir Michael Stoute is the leading trainer in the Middleton Stakes, a 1¼m Group 2 open to fillies and mares aged four years or older, having recorded six victories over the years. It could easily have been seven, too, but for a steady pace in last year's renewal, Smart Call one of two runners for the Newmarket handler who were inconvenienced in a most unsatisfactory contest...

A multiple Group 1 winner for previous connections in South Africa, **Smart Call** was making her stable debut when beaten just a length and a half 12 months ago, shaping well on her first start for 16 months, but she failed to build on that as expected in five subsequent starts, doing no better than her fourth in the Prix Jean Romanet at Deauville. Down markedly in grade, she was unable to make the most of what looked a good opportunity on her return in a listed race at Kempton and, though the step

back up in trip will be in her favour here, she is hardly one to have maximum faith in at present.

The beautifully-bred **Mori** has more to find on Timeform weight-adjusted ratings than her stablemate, but it would be no surprise if she emerged as the best of Stoute's runners, closely matched with favourite Coronet judged on their Ribblesdale encounter at Royal Ascot last season. There was only a neck between them (in Coronet's favour) that day, but their careers went in rather different directions from that

point, with Mori failing to meet expectations in a listed race at York and a Group 3 at Newmarket. She needs to bounce back if she is to be competitive here, but a wind operation over the winter could just work the trick.

Coronet, on the other hand, went from strength to strength after her Ascot success, ending the season with a trio of smart efforts in Group 1s, including when three and three quarter lengths third to Hydrangea (**Horseplay** eighth) on her final start in the Champions Fillies & Mares Stakes back at Ascot. The drop back to this trip is a slight concern after seven months off, though, and she will need all of her class to see her through here, with a first win at the highest level likely to be her chief target this term. Horseplay was a useful three-year-old and could have more to offer this term, but will need to in this company.

The Jim Bolger-trained **Turret Stakes** already has some smart Group 1 form to her name, having finished four and three quarter lengths third to Nezwaah in the Pretty Polly Stakes at the Curragh in 2017. Reported to be a stronger filly this time round, she shaped as if needing the run when fourth after 10 months off in a Group 2 at Naas last time and will relish the return to a sound surface here, while Jim Bolger doesn't bring his horses over from Ireland for the sake of it.

Indian Blessing appears to have plenty to find on what she has achieved so far, but it would be no surprise if **Chain of Daisies** played a hand in the finish, having proved as good as ever when winning a listed race at Newmarket on her final start. That wasn't a competitive race for the grade, but she's a consistent filly, smart on her day, and should continue to give a good account.

In summary, this trip might be on the short side for Coronet on her return and, at the prices, it could be worth taking a chance on the race-fit **Turret Rocks**. Good ground and 1¼m are just about her optimum conditions, as she showed when third in the Pretty Polly last year, and a repeat of that form could be good enough in a weak renewal.

Dante Stakes

The Dante Stakes has firmly established itself as the leading trial for the Derby and is named after the most recent Yorkshire-trained winner of the Epsom Classic in 1945. Horses carrying the white rose have a good record in this race in recent years, too, with three wins since 2013, and the hot streak could easily continue with two interesting contenders only having short journeys to make to the Knavesmire for this year's renewal...

Mark Johnston won the race with Permian last season and the same connections are represented by **Mildenberger** here. He showed useful form last season and took another step forward when winning a listed race on his return at Newmarket last month. The son of Teofilo shaped really promisingly with an eye to longer trips, too, his stamina really kicking in late on, and this looks the logical next step. **Wells Farhh Go** also looks sure to relish the step up to 1¼m, though he is likely to need even further than this

in time (has the St Leger as a possible target), and it is a slight concern that we haven't seen him since his Acomb Stakes victory here last August.

John Gosden has won two of the last three renewals of this race and is responsible for Blue Riband Trial winner **Crossed Baton** and 2000 Guineas fifth **Roaring Lion** this time round. The former has improved with each start this season, taking the step up in class in his stride at Epsom last time. Admittedly, he was given

an enterprising ride that day, but still showed a determined attitude to hold off My Lord And Master and Dee Ex Bee, both of whom ran well on their next starts at Chester. This will require another step forward, but he has a nice profile and should continue to give a good account.

Roaring Lion bounced back from his Craven flop when behind Saxon Warrior in the Guineas, running close to the level that saw him make a race of it with that same rival in the Racing Post Trophy last season. He might have done even better if he was with the main group in the closing stages, hanging left and ending up isolated on the near rail. This strong-travelling type will be suited by the step up in trip here and certainly has the ability to win a good race. **White Mocha** pipped Roaring Lion for second in the Craven, but it would be unwise to take that form too literally and, though open to improvement, he has plenty to find on ratings.

Aidan O'Brien has won the Dante four times in total and will be relying on **James Cook** and **Zabriskie** as he attempts to bring up the five-timer. James Cook could only finish fourth to Crossed Baton at Epsom last time, but he shaped better than the bare result, poorly placed and ultimately doing well to finish as close as he did. He didn't look the finished article, either, and this brother to the high-class Found could yet have more to offer. Zabriskie wasn't far

behind James Cook in sixth and should improve for the run, but others make more appeal.

Nordic Lights represents Godolphin in the absence of the injured Ghaiyyath. He maintained his unbeaten record in the style of a smart prospect in a minor event at Newmarket last month, defying a penalty, and seems sure to progress further. **Merlin Magic** is another who is stepping up markedly in grade, but there was lots to like about last month's handicap win at Sandown, and the step up in trip here is expected to suit.

In summary, **Mildenberger** makes most appeal at the prices. A strong stayer in the making, he is fancied to draw the sting out of the speedier Roaring Lion and can give connections another win in what doesn't look the strongest renewal of the Dante.

Yorkshire Cup

Sir Michael Stoute has been the trainer to follow in the Yorkshire Cup in recent years, winning three of the last four renewals, with the most recent of those coming courtesy of Dartmouth in a thrilling finish 12 months ago. Stoute is set to be without a runner in the 2018 renewal, but Dartmouth's owner, none other than HM The Queen, is still likely to be represented by the William Haggas-trained Call To Mind...

Call To Mind is not without a chance, either, as he attempts to provide his owner with back-to-back wins in this Group 2. He won two of his six starts last season, including a listed race at Goodwood (by a length and a quarter from **Count Octave**), and the form of his second in a Group 2 at Chantilly could hardly have worked out better, with the winner Ice Breeze going on to win at the highest level. Call To Mind looked in need of the run when fourth on his

return in the John Porter Stakes at Newbury and should have more to offer as a four-year-old.

The one he and all of his rivals have to beat appears to be **Stradivarius**, however. Trained by John Gosden, Stradivarius was very progressive last season, winning a handicap at Beverley and the Queen's Vase at Royal Ascot before beating his elders in the Goodwood Cup. He posted big efforts when third on his final two starts that season, too, in the St Leger at Doncaster

and the Long Distance Cup at Ascot, and looks sure to be a leading contender for top staying honours this term, with this a good starting point given his very smart form at the trip.

One place ahead of Stradivarius in the Long Distance Cup was **Torcedor**, who proved as good as ever when winning the Sagaro Stakes back at Ascot last time. A repeat of that form would appear to give him every chance here, though it is worth pointing out that his very best efforts have come at two miles. **Desert Skyline**, **Montaly** and the 2016 winner of this race **Clever Cookie** were all behind Torcedor in the Sagaro and look up against it once again, with the former perhaps lacking the necessary speed for this trip (also carries 3 lb penalty for his 2017 Doncaster Cup win).

Marmelo and **Wicklow Brave** (has been hurdling) make their first starts in this sphere since finishing ninth and tenth, respectively, in the Melbourne Cup. The former was a close-up fifth in this race before winning the Prix Kergorlay at Deauville in 2017, though quick ground here would be a concern (unraced on faster than good), while **Wicklow Brave** is very smart on his day but not the most consistent. Indeed, **Max Dynamite** makes most appeal of the two Willie Mullins-trained entries. Third in the aforementioned Melbourne Cup, he is fit from hurdling and should run well

back at the scene of his 2015 Lonsdale Cup win, with Ryan Moore looking set to ride.

Others to note include **On To Victory** and **Red Verdon**. The former proved better than ever when second after seven months off in a listed race at Nottingham last time, pulling clear of the rest, and should continue to give a good account, while Red Verdon could yet have a better performance in him now trying staying trips again. **Lord Yeats** shaped well, too, when second on his return in a Group 3 at Navan.

In summary, there is very little the separate the best of these on form, but if there is one horse in here that can take the staying ranks by storm in 2018 it is **Stradivarius**. He made a good fist of it last year in what is a notoriously tough division for three-year-olds and may yet prove capable of better this time round.

Handicappers To Follow

Timeform's expert team of handicappers bring you four horses to back at York's Dante Festival...

HAMADA – 14:20 York, Wednesday 16th May

Charlie Appleby

Timeform rating (101p) Hamada has clearly not been the most straightforward to train, but he rewarded the decision to persevere with him in some style when winning a handicap at Wolverhampton last time, making light of a 19-month absence to score in ready fashion. Charlie Appleby's charge has a 5 lb rise in the weights to contend with in a much more competitive event to kick-start proceedings on the Knavesmire, but he has the potential to climb higher still if able to stand more regular racing, and is one to keep on side for a yard that can seemingly do no wrong at present.

ORION'S BOW – 14:55 York, Wednesday 16th May

Tim Easterby

Timeform rating (103) Orion's Bow may have recorded a brilliant five-timer in 2016—climbing some 37 lb in the weights in doing so—but the highs of that campaign seem a long time ago now, with Tim Easterby's charge having failed to win in 10 starts last season. He shaped with considerable promise on more than one occasion, however, and there was plenty of encouragement to be taken from his return at Pontefract last month, running on strongly after being forced to switch inside the final furlong. The return to six furlongs will be in his favour and it looks only a matter of time before he strikes, now 7 lb below his last winning mark.

COMMANDER HAN – 16:35 York, Wednesday 16th May

Timeform rating (102p) Wednesday's three-year-old handicap at York is invariably one of the more competitive races of its type, but there is one horse who stands out this time round in the shape of Commander Han. A seven-length winner of a Chelmsford minor event in February, he improved again when second in a similar contest back there last time, looking the winner when moving clear early in the straight only to be run down by a promising newcomer. That rival has won again since and Commander Han looks on a more than fair mark for his handicap bow, top on Timeform weight-adjusted ratings with the prospect of more to come.

ORIGINAL CHOICE – 16:05 York, Thursday 17th May

Timeform rating (111) William Haggas loves nothing more than having winners on the Knavesmire and the Skipton-born trainer would appear to hold sound claims of getting on the scoreboard, if he isn't already, with Original Choice in Thursday's 1m handicap. A winner of two of his six starts last season (also finished second on three occasions), he got back on the up with a comfortable victory at Wetherby last time, travelling strongly and quickening well to lead entering the final furlong. He appeared to have more in hand than the neck-winning margin would suggest and looks sure to go well again from just 3 lb higher, his versatility in terms of tactics a big plus.

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


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
